



Population Pyramid: Population by Age and Sex in Redmond city, Oregon






➤ In 2019-2023, the city of Redmond had 67 dependentage residents for every 100 working-age residents, with a higher proportion of young dependents (ages 0–14) compared to older dependents (ages 65+). This ratio was slightly lower than the county-level figure of 67.2.

2023 Labor Force Participation by Age in Redmond OR





Indexed Growth Rate of Average Yearly Employment in Select Oregon Cities, Relative to 2019






A MORE BALANCED INDUSTRY COMPOSITION







TELEWORK HAS MORE THAN DOUBLED






MEDIAN VS. MEAN: UNEVEN INCOME SPREAD

Median and Mean Household Income in Select Oregon Cities






REDMOND'S HOME VALUE GROWTH HAS BEEN AMONG THE FASTEST




UNEMPLOYMENT RATES IN CENTRAL OREGON HAVE SEEN LITTLE CHANGE OVER THE PAST YEAR

Deschutes County Labor Force


January 2000 - April 2025



THE NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED PARTICIPANTS HAS ALSO BEEN ON THE RISE





U.S. and Oregon Unemployed to Job Vacancy Ratios Rising After Record Lows



- The U.S. ratio was around 1.0 in January 2025. It reached 5.0 in April 2020 after several years around 1-to-1.
- Oregon had 2.3 unemployed per job vacancy in winter 2025, the highest level since winter 2021, but still much lower than the peak of 5.7 in May 2020.






Total nonfarm Job Growth in Central Oregon,






OEA EXPECTS OREGON TO GAIN ABOUT 15,800 JOBS IN THE NEXT 12 MONTHS
