## CENSUS BUREAU INDEX OF ECONOMIC ACTIVITY









### ROGUE VALLEY SEEING RISING NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED





New or returning to the workforce 42,300 (39%)








## Most jobs back that were lost during the pandemic in the Rogue Valley- still a bit below February 2020 – seasonally adjusted





Jackson County down -0.9%, Josephine down -4.1 % (seasonally adjusted)




#### Core Jobs = Private sector payroll employment minus health care






Jackson County **Business Applications** up 2.2% from 2023-2024



### Josephine County Business Applications 2005-2024



In January 2022, the Conference Board instituted system wide changes to their data collection process to better capture when job ads have expired. As part of these changes, there is an increase in the number of ads that expired, and subsequently, a level change in the data series for Available Ads. The HWOL Index and New Ads series remain unaffected by this update.

In June 2025, Lightcast and the Conference Board instituted system wide changes to their data collection process to improve coverage of job boards. This could result in level changes in HWOL job posting volume. The HWOL Index remains unaffected by this update.


## The number of online ads in the Medford metro area was 4,300 in August. The number of new ads increased by 30 over the month.



#### Oregon's Initial Claims for Unemployment Insurance, Weekly


Josephine County, Total, All Industries by Area, by Industry

## EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES (WESTERN U.S.)

- Employment levels fell slightly in recent weeks.
- Employers lowered head counts through layoffs, hiring freezes, and attrition.
- While some businesses turned to automation technologies to maintain output levels and reduce costs, others curtailed operating times, which reduced employee hours.
- However, several contacts in finance and food services expanded their workforce to staff new locations.
- Labor availability and applicant quality rose as regional pools of workers applying for jobs expanded.
- However, some contacts reported that businesses in agriculture and construction had difficulties filling positions due to constrained labor supplies from changes in immigration policy.
- Wages were up somewhat in recent weeks, as in the prior reporting period. Contacts reported that increases were in line with or below the rate of inflation.




## **ECONOMIC ACTIVITY (OREGON AND REGION)**

- Economic activity in the Twelfth District (Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington) edged down slightly during the July to mid-August reporting period.
- Employment levels were down slightly as employers laid off workers and did not fill vacated positions.
- · Wages grew somewhat, and prices rose modestly overall.
- Conditions in retail trade and the consumer and business services sector weakened slightly.
- Manufacturing activity declined modestly, and conditions in agriculture and resource-related sectors were somewhat weaker.
- Financial sector conditions were stable. In both residential and commercial real estate, activity was slow but unchanged.
- Community support organizations struggled to balance the continued demand for services against declines in funding.
- Looking ahead, contacts' economic outlook weakened some relative to the prior reporting period.






## OEA EXPECTS OREGON TO GAIN ABOUT 28,100 JOBS IN THE NEXT 12 MONTHS.


## Expected Job Changes by Industry Sector Over The Year (3Q2025 - 3Q2026)


