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Employment in Morrow & Umatilla Counties: August 2025

Umatilla County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point to 5.4% in August. Ranked among Oregon's 36 counties, Umatilla County tied with Crook, Jefferson, and Linn counties for 20th. Over the year, Umatilla County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.8 percentage point.

Umatilla County's nonfarm employment total rose by 130 jobs to 29,930 in August. Private industry increased by 90 jobs in August, rising to 22,560, and government added 40 jobs to total 7,370. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities increased its total in August, climbing to 2,550, a gain of 90. Professional and business services added 50 jobs, rising to 1,400. Leisure and hospitality saw the largest loss, dropping 60 jobs to total 2,980. In the public sector, local education increased by 80 jobs, federal government added 10 jobs, other local government decreased by 40, Indian tribal dropped 10, and state government held steady.

Umatilla County's total private industry employment increased by 130 jobs over the year ending in August (+0.6%). Retail trade led losses, falling by 200 jobs (-5.8%). Private education and health services led private-industry gains, rising by 130 jobs (+2.9%), followed by information, up 110 jobs (+13.9%) over the year. Retail trade dropped 90 jobs over the year. Government employment decreased by 90 jobs over the year, led by a loss of 110 jobs in local education. Other local government fell by 20 jobs, Indian tribal dropped 10, state government added 50, and federal government held steady.

Morrow County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady in August at 4.9%, ranking in a tie with Lane, Marion, and Multnomah counties for 13th among Oregon counties. Over the year, Morrow County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 1.0 percentage point.

Morrow County's nonfarm employment increased to 5,830 in August, a gain of 90 jobs. Private industry increased by 50 jobs, rising to 4,840 jobs, and government added 40 jobs to total 990. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities increased by 30 jobs to lead gains. Losses were confined to leisure and hospitality, down 10. In the public sector, local government increased by 40 jobs, while state government and federal government held steady.

Morrow County's private-industry employment rose by 10 jobs over the year ending in August (+0.2%). Private industry's over-the-year growth was led by a gain in construction, up 60 jobs, followed by a gain

of 40 jobs in transportation, warehousing, and utilities. Professional and business services led losses, down 170 jobs. Government employment rose by 50 jobs over the year, with local government adding 60 jobs, federal government dropping 10, and state government holding steady.

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The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
