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Employment in Eastern Oregon: April 2025

The April seasonally adjusted unemployment rates held steady over the year in Baker and Harney counties and increased in the other four Eastern Oregon counties. Baker County's April 2025 rate tied for its second lowest April rate since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Harney, Malheur, and Wallowa counties, they are the third lowest April rates. The seasonally adjusted rate moved 0.2 percentage point higher in Malheur County to reach 4.2% for the smallest increase. The largest increase came in Grant County where the seasonally adjusted rate rose 0.8 percentage point to reach 6.4%.

Between April 2024 and April 2025, unadjusted unemployment rates decreased in Harney and Malheur counties and increased in the other four counties. Harney and Malheur counties' April 2025 unadjusted rates are their second lowest unadjusted April unemployment rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Wallowa County, the April 2025 rate is its third lowest April rate. The April 2025 rates are the fourth lowest April rates in Baker, Grant, and Union counties. Harney County's raw rate fell by 0.4 percentage point to reach 4.0% for the largest decrease. The largest increase came in Wallowa County, where the raw rate increased by 1.1 percentage points to reach 5.8%.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment has increased by 50 jobs since April 2024. Employment increased by 20 jobs in the private sector and added 30 jobs in the public sector. Retail trade led gains, up 60 jobs. Leisure and hospitality led losses, down 30. Total nonfarm employment increased by 50 jobs over the month led by gains in leisure and hospitality, and other services, up 20 jobs each. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.8%. The raw unemployment rate fell by 1.6 percentage points to 4.4%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 10 jobs over the year. The private sector added 20 jobs while the public sector decreased by 10. State government added 40 jobs to lead gains, followed by construction, up 30. Manufacturing dropped 40 jobs to lead losses, followed by federal government, down 30. Over the month, total nonfarm employment increased by 20 jobs. Construction and leisure and hospitality each added 20 jobs and mining and logging dropped 20. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 6.4%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.5 percentage points to 7.1%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 10 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 20 jobs, and the public sector added 30. Gains were led by local government, up 50 jobs. Losses were led by retail trade, down 40 jobs. Total nonfarm employment increased by 20 jobs over the

month, with small gains in goods-producing, professional and business services, and leisure and hospitality, up 10 each. The only industry to lose jobs was private education and health services, down 10. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.5%. The raw unemployment rate fell by 1.7 percentage points to 4.0%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 110 jobs over the year. The private sector fell by 40, and the public sector added 150 jobs. Local government added 110 jobs to lead gains, followed by a gain of 80 jobs in manufacturing. Mining, logging, and construction dropped 70 jobs to lead losses, followed by leisure and hospitality, down 50. Total nonfarm employment increased by 40 jobs over the month, led by a gain of 40 jobs in retail trade. Wholesale trade led losses, down 40. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.2%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.5 percentage points to 3.4%.

Union County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 110 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 250 jobs, and the public sector increased by 140 jobs. Local government led gains, up 130 jobs. Manufacturing and financial activities dropped 50 jobs each to lead losses, followed by professional and business services, and leisure and hospitality, down 40 jobs each. Total nonfarm employment increased by 30 jobs over the month, with construction, and leisure and hospitality leading gains, up 30 each. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 5.2%. The raw unemployment rate fell by 1.6 percentage points to 4.9%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 50 jobs from April 2024 to April 2025. The private sector added 20 jobs, and the public sector increased by 30. State government led gains, up 20 jobs. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities led losses, down 20. Total nonfarm employment increased by 100 jobs over the month led by a gain of 30 jobs in leisure and hospitality, followed by gains of 20 jobs each in professional and business services, and federal government. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 5.0%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 1.5 percentage points to 5.8%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
