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Employment in Lincoln County: July 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 130 jobs in July

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 130 in July to 18,340 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 190 jobs was expected for the month. The county's total nonfarm employment actually increased by 60, with a gain of 260 jobs in the private sector, and government employment decreased by 200. Leisure and hospitality added 220 jobs. Professional and business services added 30 jobs. Local education employment decreased by 210.

July's total nonfarm employment numbers were down 200 jobs over the year, a decrease of 1%. The largest gains occurred in accommodation which rose by 80 jobs over the year in July. Professional and business services lost 110 jobs. Indian tribal lost 70 jobs.

Lincoln County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.6% in July, up from 5.5% in June. It edged up from 5.1% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.0% in July, and the national rate was 4.2%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
