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## **Employment in Lincoln County: August 2025**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment increased by 40 jobs in August**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 40 in August to 18,380 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 60 jobs was expected for the month. The county's total nonfarm employment actually increased by 100, with a gain of 70 jobs in the private sector, while government employment increased by 30. Private education and health services added 20 jobs. Accommodation lost 30 jobs. Local education employment increased by 30.

August's total nonfarm employment numbers were down 400 jobs over the year, a decrease of 2%. The largest gains occurred in accommodation which rose by 170 jobs over the year in August. Professional and business services lost 280 jobs. Indian tribal lost 90 jobs.

Lincoln County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.8% in August, up from 5.6% in July. It was up from 5.1% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.0% in August, and the national rate was 4.3%.

Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
