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## Employment in South Coast: April 2025 South Coast Adds Leisure and Hospitality Jobs Over the Year

Coos County total payroll employment fell by 180 jobs in April. Most of the decline was due to a seasonally typical loss in local government education. In April, job gains were estimated in leisure and hospitality (+40), and professional and business services (+20). Manufacturing employment slipped by 20 jobs in April. Government employment fell by 210 jobs in April with job declines in local government education (-180); local government excluding tribal and education (-20); and Indian tribal local government (-10).

Since April 2024, Coos County has gained 80 payroll jobs, an increase of 0.3%. Employment gains occurred in professional and business services (+110); leisure and hospitality (+70); manufacturing (+50); and financial activities (+20). Transportation, warehousing, and utilities (-70); retail trade (-70); and construction (-30) lost jobs over the year. Government employment was unchanged with state government adding 10 jobs and federal government employment down by 10.

Curry County payroll employment rose by 40 jobs in April. Leisure and hospitality employment rose by 60 jobs. Private education and health services shed 20 jobs in April.

Over the past year, Curry County payroll employment gained 40 jobs, an increase of 0.6%. Losses were estimated financial activities (-40); trade, transportation, and utilities (-40); and professional and business services (-20). However, employment rose in private education and health services (+50); leisure and hospitality (+40); manufacturing (+20); and construction (+20).

The Oregon Employment Department plans to release the May county and metropolitan area unemployment rates and employment survey data on Tuesday, June 24<sup>th</sup>, and the statewide unemployment rate and employment survey data for May on Wednesday, June 18<sup>th</sup>.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
