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Employment in Clatsop County: January 2023

Seasonally adjusted employment jumped by 120 in January

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 120 in January to 18,920 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A loss of 320 jobs was expected for the month, but the county shed only 200 jobs. The private sector dropped 170 jobs, and total government employment fell by 30. The leisure and hospitality industry lost 140 jobs. Manufacturing trimmed 40 jobs. On the other hand, professional and business services added 70 jobs. Local government education cut 40 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

January's total nonfarm employment was up from the previous year by 350 jobs, an increase of 2.0%. The county lost 4,820 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remains 320 jobs below the prepandemic level of January 2019. Some major industries gained jobs over the past year but others have plateaued or shed a few. Food manufacturing was up 160 jobs, though this industry often has large fluctuations in employment associated with the Dungeness crab season. Leisure and hospitality added 140 jobs over the previous year. Other services gained 50 jobs. Local government education shed 40 jobs over the year.

Clatsop County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in January. It was unchanged from 4.7% in December. The rate was 4.5% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.8% in January, and the national rate was 3.4%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
