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Employment in Morrow & Umatilla Counties: January 2023

Unemployment Rates Rise Above Year-Ago Levels

Umatilla County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.2 percentage point to 5.1% in January. Ranked among Oregon's 36 counties, Umatilla County placed 22nd in January, tied with Columbia. Over the year, Umatilla County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.8 percentage point.

Umatilla County's nonfarm employment fell by 340 jobs in January, dropping to 28,540. Mining, logging, and construction cut 90 jobs, falling to 1,190, and transportation, warehousing, and utilities lost 90, dropping to 2,450. Leisure and hospitality (-70); education and health services (-50); and retail trade (-40) also cut jobs. In the public sector, other local government rose by 30 to 1,150 and local education chipped in 20 to reach 2,680. Umatilla County remains 150 jobs shy (-0.5%) of its pre-pandemic high.

Umatilla County's total private employment rose by 200 jobs over the year ending in January. Leisure and hospitality led private industry, rising by 190 jobs to reach 2,750 (+7.4%). Information increased its total by 120 jobs, climbing to 710 (+20.3%). Transportation, warehousing, and utilities lost 160 jobs over the year ending in January, falling to 2,450 (-6.1%). Manufacturing (-130) and education and health services (-40) also cut jobs over the year. Indian tribal government rose by 140 jobs over the year to 1,760, local education increased its total by 130, and other local chipped in 80.

Morrow County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point in January to 4.3% to rank 10th among Oregon counties, tied with Wasco. Over the year, Morrow County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.5 percentage point.

Morrow County's nonfarm employment held steady in January at 5,610 jobs. In the private sector, transportation, warehousing, and utilities cut 10 jobs, falling to 190. Federal government cut 10 jobs in January, falling to 50, and local government shed 10.

Morrow County's private-industry employment rose by 380 jobs over the year ending in January (+9.2%). Manufacturing led private industry, rising by 110 jobs or 6.3% to total 1,850. Professional and business services rose by 40 jobs, climbing to 330. Retail trade (+30), construction (+20), and leisure and hospitality (+10) also rose over the year. Local government rose by 50 jobs over the year to reach 970.

Next Press Releases

The Oregon Employment Department plans to release the February 2023 county and metropolitan area unemployment rates on March 28th, 2023 and the statewide unemployment rate and employment survey data on March 21st, 2023.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of w ork and cover full- and part-time employees w ho w orked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family w orkers, and domestics.
