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Employment in Columbia County: February 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 60 in February

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 60 in February to 11,900 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 40 jobs was expected for the month, and the county's payroll employment decreased by 20. The private sector lost 30 jobs, and government employment grew by 10. Trade, transportation, and utilities added 20 jobs. Professional and business services employment decreased by 30. Other industries had little or no job change over the month.

February's total nonfarm employment was down from the previous year by 130 jobs, a decrease of 1.1%. Some broad sectors gained jobs over the past year. The largest gain occurred in private education and health services, which added 60 jobs (+3.8%). Professional and business services was down 110 jobs over the year (-9.2%). Local government, including education, was down 100 jobs over the year (-5.5%).

Columbia County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.2% in February, up from 5.0% in January. It was 5.0% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.5% in February, and the national rate was 4.1%.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
