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# Employment in Eastern Oregon: June 2024 Eastern Oregon Unemployment Rates Remain Comparatively Low

The June seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased over the year in Grant and Wallowa counties while increasing in the other four Eastern Oregon counties. In Grant and Wallowa counties, they have the lowest June rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker, Harney, and Malheur counties, the June 2024 rates are the second lowest June rates. In Union County, only 2023 and 2022 had lower June rates. The seasonally adjusted rate moved 0.1 percentage point lower in both Grant and Wallowa counties to reach 5.0% and 4.3%, respectively. The largest increase came in Union County where the seasonally adjusted rate rose 0.9 percentage point to reach 4.6%.

Between June 2023 and June 2024, unadjusted unemployment rates increased in four of six Eastern Oregon counties. Wallowa County was the only county to see a decrease in the raw unemployment rate, while Baker County's was unchanged. Wallowa County's slipped 0.1 percentage point to 3.3%. This represented the lowest June unadjusted rate for the county since 1990. In Baker County, the June 2024 rate tied June 2023 for the lowest unadjusted June unemployment rate. In Grant, Harney, and Union counties, the only lower June rates were in 2023. Malheur County's June 2024 rate was its third lowest June rate, behind 2023 and 1990. The smallest over-the-year increase came in Grant County, where the raw rate increased by 0.1 percentage point to reach 4.4%. The largest increase came in Union County, where the raw rate increased by 0.5 percentage point to reach 4.2%.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment has decreased by 60 since June 2023. Employment decreased by 70 jobs in the private sector and added 10 jobs in the public sector. Leisure and hospitality led losses, down 30. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities and state government led gains, each up 20 jobs. Overall employment increased by 30 jobs over the month led by a gain of 20 jobs in leisure and hospitality. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percentage point to 3.9%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 40 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 50 jobs while the public sector increased by 90. Local government and state government led gains, up 50 and 40 jobs, respectively. Retail trade dropped 20 jobs to lead losses. Over the month, total employment rose by 80 jobs led by a gain of 40 jobs in state government. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 5.0%. The raw unemployment rate fell 0.4 percentage point to 4.4%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 50 jobs over the year. The private sector decreased by 70 jobs, and the public sector added 20. Losses were led by retail trade and goods-producing, down 30 and 20 jobs, respectively. Gains were confined to local government and private education and health services, up 20 and 10 jobs, respectively. Total employment saw a net change of zero jobs over the month, led by gains of 20 jobs each in leisure and hospitality and federal government. Losses were led by a drop of 40 jobs in local government. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate slipped 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.3%. The raw unemployment rate held steady at 3.7%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 330 jobs over the year. The private sector rose by 150, and the public sector added 180 jobs. Local government added 140 to lead gains, followed by private education and health services, up 60. Other services dropped 20 jobs to lead losses. Total employment decreased by 10 over the month, with local government leading the losses, down 30 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 3.9%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.6 percentage point to 4.0%.

Union County's total nonfarm payroll employment saw a net change of zero jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 60 jobs, and the public sector increased by 60. Manufacturing led losses, down 100 jobs. Local government led gains, up 40, followed by financial activities and private education and health services, each up 40 jobs. Total employment increased by 200 jobs over the month, with manufacturing leading gains, up 170. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.6%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 0.5 percentage point to 4.2%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment saw a net change of zero jobs from June 2023 to June 2024. The private sector dropped 20 jobs, and the public sector increased by 20. Offsetting gains and losses were spread across industries. Total nonfarm employment increased by 140 over the month, led by gains in leisure and hospitality, up 90 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.3%. The raw unemployment rate dropped 0.6 percentage point to 3.3%.

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The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
