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# Employment in Eastern Oregon: July 2024 Eastern Oregon Unemployment Rates Remain Comparatively Low

The July seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased over the year in Wallowa County while increasing in the other five Eastern Oregon counties. Wallowa County has the lowest July rate since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker, Grant, Harney, and Malheur counties, the July 2024 rates are the second lowest July rates. In Union County, only 2023 and 2019 had lower July rates. The seasonally adjusted rate moved 0.1 percentage point lower in Wallowa County to reach 4.3%. The largest increase came in Union County where the seasonally adjusted rate rose 0.8 percentage point to reach 4.6%.

Between July 2023 and July 2024, unadjusted unemployment rates increased in five of six Eastern Oregon counties. Baker County's raw unemployment rate was unchanged over the year. In Baker County, the July 2024 rate tied July 2023 for the lowest unadjusted July unemployment rate, at 4.2%. In Harney, Malheur, and Wallowa counties, the only lower July rates were in 2023. The smallest over-the-year increase came in Wallowa County, where the raw rate increased by 0.2 percentage point to reach 3.5%. The largest increase came in Union County, where the raw rate increased by 1.0 percentage point to reach 4.5%.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment has decreased by 60 jobs since July 2023. Employment decreased by 80 jobs in the private sector and added 20 jobs in the public sector. Professional and business services led losses, down 60. Private education and health services led gains, up 40 jobs. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 110 jobs over the month led by a loss of 160 jobs in local government as schools shut down for summer. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.3 percentage point to 4.2%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 110 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 100 jobs while the public sector decreased by 10. Manufacturing dropped 50 jobs to lead losses. Construction led gains, up 20 jobs. Over the month, total nonfarm employment fell by 80 jobs led by a loss of 130 jobs in local government as schools closed for the summer break. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.2 percentage point over the month to 5.2%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.4 percentage point to 4.9%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 120 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 50 jobs, and the public sector decreased by 70. Losses were led by local government and retail trade, down 50 and 40 jobs, respectively. Gains were confined to private education and health services, up 30 jobs. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 50 jobs over the month, led by a drop of 50 jobs in local government. Gains were confined to federal government and retail trade, up 20 and 10 jobs, respectively. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.4 percentage point to 4.1%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 150 jobs over the year. The private sector rose by 110, and the public sector added 40 jobs. Private education and health services added 70 jobs to lead gains, followed by wholesale trade, up 40. Leisure and hospitality and federal government each dropped 20 jobs to lead losses. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 210 over the month, with local government leading the losses, down 160 jobs as schools shut down for summer. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 3.9%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percentage point to 4.2%.

Union County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 210 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 230 jobs, and the public sector increased by 20. Manufacturing led losses, down 210 jobs, followed by retail trade, down 80. Private education and health services led gains, up 60 jobs. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 140 jobs over the month, with local government leading losses, down 230 as schools shuttered jobs for summer. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady over the month at 4.6%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.3 percentage point to 4.5%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 10 jobs from July 2023 to July 2024. The private sector dropped 40 jobs, and the public sector increased by 30. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities led losses, down 30 jobs. Leisure and hospitality led gains, up 40 jobs, followed by wholesale and retail trade, up 30. Total nonfarm employment increased by 90 over the month, led by gains in leisure and hospitality, up 40 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.3%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percentage point to 3.5%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
