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Employment in Lincoln County: September 2024

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 20 jobs in September

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 20 in September to 18,660 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A loss of 300 jobs was expected for the month. The county's total nonfarm employment actually decreased by 320, with a loss of 370 jobs in the private sector, and a gain of 50 jobs in government. Private education and health services led private-sector job gains with an increase of 20 jobs. Leisure and hospitality lost 300 jobs. Local education, a component of local government, added 70 jobs.

September's total nonfarm employment numbers were down by 230 jobs over the year, a decrease of 1.2%. The largest gain of any sector occurred in other services, which rose by 30 jobs over the year in September. Food manufacturing lost 160 jobs. Accommodation and food services, a component of leisure and hospitality, shed 110 jobs over the year. Local education added 80 jobs over the past year. Indian tribal employment fell by 50 jobs.

Lincoln County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in September, unchanged from 4.7% in August. It edged up from 4.2% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.0% in September, and the national rate was 4.1%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
