Employment in Salem MSA (Marion and Polk Counties): April 2023

Salem MSA's Unemployment Rate Drops to 4.0%

The Salem MSA's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.0% in April, down from its revised rate of 4.3% in March. Oregon's statewide unemployment rate in April was 4.0%, down slightly from its revised March rate of 4.4%.

Employment gains in the Salem MSA in April were larger than normal; total nonfarm employment increased by 1,100 jobs, when an employment increase of 600 jobs would be expected. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment increased 500 between March and April. With April's gains, employment is up 3.4% or 5,900 jobs above the pre-pandemic employment level in February 2020.

Overall the private sector added 800 jobs in April. The largest private-sector job gains in April were reported in private education and health services (+300 jobs, +0.9%); and leisure and hospitality (+300 jobs, +2.0%).

The largest private-sector job losses in April were reported in professional and business services (-200 jobs, -1.1%).

The public sector added 300 jobs in April. Local government employment was up 100 jobs in April while state government added 200 jobs. Federal government employment was unchanged.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Offical Oregon Series. Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
