Employment in Salem MSA (Marion and Polk Counties): February 2025

Salem MSA's Employment Gains 700 Jobs

Employment gains in the Salem MSA in February were more than normal; total nonfarm employment increased by 1,500 jobs, when an employment increase of 800 jobs would be expected. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment was up 700 between January and February. With February's gains, employment is up 8.2% or 14,300 jobs above the prepandemic employment level in February 2020.

Overall, private-sector employment was up 1,500 in February. The largest private-sector job gains in February were reported in professional and business services (+800 jobs, +4.3%) and health care and social assistance (+600 jobs, +1.8%).

The public sector added 200 jobs in February. Local government was up 200 jobs in February. State and federal government employment were both unchanged in February.

The Salem MSA's unadjusted unemployment rate was 5.0% in February, down from its revised rate of 5.1% in January. Oregon's statewide unadjusted unemployment rate in February was 5.2%, down from its revised January rate of 5.3%.

Labor force statistics for Oregon metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) are produced by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. Through June 2025, seasonally adjusted data are not available for Oregon MSAs or other MSAs around the country. New MSA definitions resulting from the 2020 Census are being incorporated into the history of the data series back to 1990, as well as other updates to the processing of labor force estimates for substate areas. The most recent month is preliminary, the prior month is revised. Prepared in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Official Oregon Series. Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
