
Employment in South Central Oregon: October 2022

Hiring patterns in October were largely consistent with seasonal norms for the month in both Klamath and Lake counties. Unemployment levels ticked up in both counties.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.7% in October, up from a revised 5.5% in September. The unemployment rate is similar to levels from before the first impacts of COVID-19 when it was 5.8% in February 2020.

Klamath County added 10 jobs in October, less gains than are typical this time of year. Employment levels in Klamath County remain down 0.6% (-150 jobs) from levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County added 570 jobs in the past year (+2.5%). Job gains continue to be widespread with notable gains over the past year in private education and health services (+210 jobs); leisure and hospitality (+130 jobs);



construction (+110); and in the public sector, local government education (+90). Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in federal government (-70) and professional and business services (-90 jobs).

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.2% in October, up from its revised rate of 4.9% in September. The rate was 3.8% in February 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County added 10 jobs in October, slightly larger gains than are typical this time of year. As of October 2022, total nonfarm employment levels remain down around 120 jobs (-5.0%) from levels before the onset of the pandemic in February 2020.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment is down by 40 jobs (-1.7%) from last year. The only notable gains were in leisure and hospitality, manufacturing, retail trade; and education and health services which each

increased 10 jobs. The notable job losses were a decrease of 20 jobs in local government and 20 jobs in federal government.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
