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
Employment in South Central Oregon: January 2023

Hiring patterns in January were largely consistent with seasonal norms for the month in both Klamath and Lake counties. Unemployment levels increased in both counties.

<u>Klamath County:</u> The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.5% in January, up from a revised 6.4% in December. The unemployment rate is slightly above levels from before the first impacts of COVID-19 when it was 6.1% in February 2020.

Klamath County shed 460 jobs in January, job losses that are typical this time of year. Employment levels in Klamath County are up 0.9% (+210 jobs) from levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County added 350 jobs in the past year (+1.6%). Job gains continue to be widespread with notable gains over the past year in private education



and health services (+110 jobs), leisure and hospitality (+30), and manufacturing (+20). In the public sector, local government is up 100 jobs. Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in mining and logging (-40 jobs) and food and beverage retailers (-20).

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.1% in January, up slightly from its revised rate of 6.0% in December. The rate was 4.2% in February 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County lost 40 jobs in January, larger losses than are typical this time of year. As of January 2023, total nonfarm employment levels remain down 80 jobs (-3.3%) from levels before the onset of the pandemic in February 2020.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment is at the same level as last year. The only notable gains were in local and federal government which each added 20 jobs. The notable job loss was a decrease of 30 jobs in private education and health services.

Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

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The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
