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
Employment in South Central Oregon: April 2023

Seasonally adjusted unemployment rates continued to fall in April in both Klamath and Lake County.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.1% in April, down from 6.5% in March. The unemployment rate in April 2022 was 5.5%.

Klamath County gained 280 jobs in April, job gains that are normal this time of year. Employment levels in Klamath County are up 0.3% (+80 jobs) from levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County added 110 jobs in the past year (+0.5%). Notable private-sector job gains over the



past year were seen in private education and health services (+200); other services (+60); general merchandise retailers (+40); and transportation, warehousing, and utilities (+20). In the public sector, local government employment was up by 120, while federal and state employment was up by 30 and 40, respectively. Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in professional and business services (-110 jobs); manufacturing (-70 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-60 jobs); and mining, logging, and construction (-60 jobs).

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased to 5.6% in April, down from 5.9% in March. The rate was 4.2% in January 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County employment held steady in April, when employment gains are typical for this time of year. As of April 2023, total nonfarm employment levels remain 80 jobs (-3.4%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment saw a decline of 30 jobs over the year (-1.3%), with the only notable gains in other services, which added 20 jobs over the year. Both construction and private

education and health services saw declines of 20 jobs over the year, followed by professional and business services (-10 jobs); manufacturing (-10 jobs); and trade, transportation, and utilities (-10 jobs).

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Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
