

Employment in South Central Oregon: October 2023

October unemployment levels saw little to no change in South Central Oregon. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased slightly in Klamath County and was unchanged in Lake County.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.0% in October, down from 5.1% in September. The unemployment rate in October 2022 was 6.6%.

Klamath County lost 150 jobs in October; larger losses than expected this year. Seasonally adjusted employment levels in Klamath County are 2.8% (+650 jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.



Klamath County added 620 jobs in the past year (+2.6%). Notable private-sector job gains over the past year were seen in private education and health services (+290 jobs); other services (+90 jobs); and construction (+60 jobs). In the public sector, government employment was up by 350 jobs with the majority taking place in local government (+290 jobs). Federal and state job counts were up by 40 and 20, respectively. Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in manufacturing (-140 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-120 jobs); and information (-10 jobs).

<u>Lake County</u>: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady in Lake County at 4.8% in October. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in January 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County employment decreased by 20 jobs in October, typical losses for this time of year with the only notable monthly gains in local government (+20 jobs). As of October 2023, seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 150 jobs (-6.3%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment is down by 40 jobs over the year with the only notable gains in private education and health services (+10 jobs); financial activities (+10 jobs); other services (+10 jobs); and state government (+10). These gains were overshadowed by losses in local government (-30 jobs); leisure and hospitality (-20 jobs); and retail trade (-20 jobs).

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
