
Employment in South Central Oregon: November 2024

Seasonally adjusted unemployment rates saw little to no change in South Central Oregon this November, with a slight decrease in Lake County. Total nonfarm employment increased year-over-year in Klamath County by 20 jobs and increased in Lake County by 30 jobs.

<u>Klamath County:</u> The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in November remained steady at 5.5%. The unemployment rate in November 2023 was 5.2%.

Klamath County lost 260 jobs (-1.1%) in November, with the majority of losses taking place in leisure and hospitality (-120 jobs) and the public sector (-70 jobs). Gains occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities (+10 jobs). Seasonally adjusted employment levels in Klamath County are now 1.8% (+410 jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County gained 20 jobs in the private sector in the past year (+0.1%) with



gains concentrated in private education and health services (+180 jobs) and construction (+50 jobs). Notable private-sector job losses over the past year were seen in professional and business services (-50 jobs); other services (-50 jobs); and manufacturing (-40 jobs).

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased marginally from 4.9% in October to 4.8% in November – last November it was 5.2%. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in January 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County employment decreased by 30 jobs in November (-1.3%). Small job losses were seen in leisure and hospitality (-10 jobs), other services (-10 jobs), professional and business services (-10 jobs), and the public sector (-10 jobs). Retail trade saw a small gain of 10 jobs. All other industries saw

little to no gains in November. Seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 130 jobs (-5.4%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels, as of November.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment rose by 30 jobs since November 2023. Small gains were seen in manufacturing (+20 jobs), while mining and logging, leisure and hospitality, and the public sector each gained 10 jobs. Losses were seen in trade, transportation, and utilities, and other services (-10 jobs each). All other major industries saw little to no change over the year.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
