
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Employment in South Central Oregon: February 2025

Total nonfarm employment increased in Klamath County while decreasing in Lake County over the year. Over the month, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose slightly in South Central Oregon, with marginal increases in both counties this February.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased in February and is now 5.8%, up from 5.7% in January. In February 2024 the unemployment rate was lower at 5.3%.

Klamath County gained 190 jobs (+0.8%) in February, with the majority of gains taking place within trade, transportation, and utilities (+50 jobs), government (+50 jobs), and professional and business services (+30 jobs). While employment within both the information industry and the mining and logging sector was unchanged over the month, all other major industries gained 10 jobs with no job losses recorded. Seasonally adjusted employment levels in Klamath County are now 2.2% (+510



jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County gained 40 jobs in the past year (+0.2%) with gains concentrated in private education and health services (+180 jobs); construction (+40 jobs); and financial activities (+30 jobs). Notable private-sector job losses over the past year were seen in leisure and hospitality (-110 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-30 jobs); manufacturing (-30 jobs); other services (-20 jobs); mining and logging (-10 jobs); and information (-10 jobs). All other industries saw little to no change over the month.

<u>Lake County</u>: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased from a revised rate of 4.8% in January to 5.1% in February – last February it was 5.3%. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in February 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

The employment situation in Lake County was little changed in February. Total nonfarm employment increased from January to February by 10 jobs (+0.5%). Small job gains were seen within leisure and hospitality (+10 jobs) and the public sector (+10 jobs). However, private-sector gains were offset by job losses within other services (-10 jobs), leading to no change in private employment over the month, as all other industries saw little to no gains in February. Seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 190 jobs (-7.9%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels, as of February.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment declined by 40 jobs (-1.8%) since February 2024. Supersector gains were minimal and concentrated in financial activities (+10 jobs) and leisure and hospitality (+10 jobs). Losses were larger and concentrated within the public sector (-30 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-20 jobs); and other services. All other major industries saw little to no growth over the year.

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Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
