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## **Employment in Tillamook County: January 2023**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment jumped by 100 in January**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 100 in January to 9,450 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 150 jobs, but the county shed only 50 jobs. The private sector lost 80 jobs, and total government employment rose by 30. The leisure and hospitality sector shed 50 jobs. Food manufacturing cut 40 jobs in January. Other industries had smaller changes.

January's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 110 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 1.2%. The county lost 1,520 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and as of January it remained down about 150 jobs from January 2019, before the pandemic. Manufacturing grew by 80 jobs over the year. Leisure and hospitality lost 100 jobs. Local government, including education, regained 110 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in January, essentially unchanged from 4.6% in December. It was 4.4% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.8% in January, and the national rate was 3.4%.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
