## **Employment in Tillamook County: July 2023**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment grew by 40 in July**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment grew in July to 9,510 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 100 jobs, and the county added 140 jobs. The private sector added 220 jobs, and total government employment decreased by 80. Leisure and hospitality added 130 jobs. Retail trade grew by 40 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

July's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 170 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 1.8%. The county lost 1,260 jobs in March 2020 as the pandemic hit, and as of July it remained down 110 jobs from July 2019, before the pandemic. Food manufacturing grew by 220 jobs over the past year to July. Other services added 50 jobs. Education and health services lost 110 jobs during the year. Local government gained 50 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.7% in July, essentially unchanged from 3.8% in June. It was 4.5% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 3.4% in July, and the national rate was 3.5%.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
