Employment in Tillamook County: October 2024

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 40 in October

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 40 in October to 9,660 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 70 jobs, and the county lost 110 jobs, with a loss of 130 jobs in the private sector, and a government employment increase of 20. Multiple private industries had minor employment gains. Leisure and hospitality lost 120 jobs. Local education added 30 jobs.

October's total nonfarm employment was down from the previous year by 70 jobs, a decrease of 0.7%. Private education and health services had the largest gain, adding 40 jobs (3.7%) over the past year. Food manufacturing lost 150 jobs during the year, a decline of 11.3%. State and local government each added 30 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.9% in October, which was unchanged from September. It was 3.8% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.0% in October, and the national rate was 4.1%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
