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# **Employment in Tillamook County: January 2025**

## Seasonally adjusted employment increased by 40 in January

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 40 in January to 9,700 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 150 jobs, and the county lost 110 jobs, with a loss of 120 jobs in the private sector, and a gain of 10 jobs in total government employment. Leisure and hospitality lost 50 jobs. Manufacturing lost 40 jobs. Other industries had little or no change.

January's total nonfarm employment was up from the previous year by 220 jobs, an increase of 2.4%. Leisure and hospitality had the largest gains, adding 70 jobs (5.6%) over the past year. Retail trade lost 30 jobs during the year, a decline of 2.8%. Local government added 60 jobs over the year (+3.7%).

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.1% in January, up from 3.9% in December. It was 3.9% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.4% in January, and the national rate was 4.0%.

Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
