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Employment in Yamhill County: February 2023

Yamhill County's Unemployment Rate Increases to 4.1%

Yamhill County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.1% in February, up slightly from its revised rate of 4.0% in January. Oregon's statewide unemployment rate in February was 4.7%, down slightly from its revised January rate of 4.8%.

Yamhill County's employment gains in February were less than normal; total nonfarm employment increased 300 jobs, when an employment increase of 630 jobs would be expected. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment was down 330 in February. Employment is +0.9%, or 330 jobs, above the pre-pandemic level in February 2020.

The private sector added 340 jobs in February. Sectors gaining the most employment in February were private educational services (\pm 270 jobs, \pm 11.2%), manufacturing (\pm 60 jobs, \pm 0.8%), and leisure and hospitality (\pm 50 jobs, \pm 1.4%).

The largest losses were in retail trade (-50 jobs, -1.3%) and health care and social assistance (-30 jobs, -0.5%).

Yamhill County's public-sector employment was down 40 in February. Local government employment declined 40. Federal and state government employment were both unchanged in February.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
