SEASONALLY ADJUSTED EMPLOYMENT ESTIMATES

Oregon's unemployment rate was 4.1% in December and 4.1% in November.

- Oregon's monthly unemployment rate has been between 4.0% and 4.2% for 15 months.
- The U.S. unemployment rate was 4.1% in December and 4.2% in November.

Oregon employers lost 3,700 jobs from nonfarm payrolls in December.

- December gains were largest in private education and health services (+2,200 jobs) and government (+700).
- Declines were largest in leisure and hospitality (-1,900 jobs).

Nonfarm payroll employment added 22,000 jobs over the past year, a gain of 1.1%.

- The private sector gained 15,000 jobs (0.9%) over the past year.
- Gains were concentrated in private education and health services (+20,500 jobs, +6.2%).



By 2022, nearly one-fourth of all jobs in Oregon and the U.S. were held by workers 55+ years old.

For Construction, 23% of the labor force are 55+ are more likely to retire from the workforce.
