# Portland Tribune Reader Sentiment is Mixed, but Largely Gloomy

Reader: "Prices are going up but business's can't afford a higher wages for employees."

Reader: "Inflation is too high. Housing is too high. Insurance is too high."

Reader: "Businesses are hiring and building is happening. Infrastructure projects all over the state. People are traveling. The shopping malls are crowded."

Reader: "A person can't afford to live and eat in Oregon."

Reader: "I am working one full-time job and two part-time jobs and barely supporting a family with house payments, school debt, taxes, and inflation."

Reader: "Utilities keep going up. The cost of groceries is ridiculous as well as gas prices. The cost of rent/mortgages are rising. The roads are not getting repaired. The only concern the government has is about the homeless population."

Reader: "Everything is too expensive: buying a house, renting, gas, food, power bills and heating bills, we're over-taxed."

Reader: "Too many people are struggling to make it. Housing costs are too high."

Reader: "Inflation along with lack of employment compensation to offset the effects of high prices for basic needs is creating hardships for low and middle class folks."

Reader: "Unemployment is low, many employers are hiring, several unions negotiated pay raises for their employees, lots of spending during the holidays and people are traveling."

Reader: "Rent and housing too high. A loaf of bread and a can of beans cost \$8.50. 4 years ago \$2.00 for the same."

Reader: "I'm doing well financially and everyone I know is also doing well. All the businesses I visit are busy."

Reader: "More and more people—even working full time, even working more than one job—can't afford a place to live as well as groceries, medical care, transportation, etc."

Reader: "Everyone, everywhere has taken a hit over the past several years.


As a whole, I think the state is rebounding incredibly well financially."

Reader: "Things haven't changed for me because I have a stable job and own my home. Things have gotten really expensive though, I can afford it but many people are struggling right now."


Portland MSA Year-Over-Year Job Change





### Utilities Industry Grew 19% in Employment and 29% in Real Wages Over the Decade in the Portland MSA






# Portland MSA Energy Utilities Supply A Large Chunk of Employment and Wages

Portland MSA power generation and supply as percentage of Oregon's



## Portland MSA Power Generation and Supply Wages Tend to Be Higher than Utilities and All Industry Wages


#### Average Wage by Industry

Median Wage of Top 10 Occupations in Electric Utilities in the Portland MSA





#### Portland MSA is Less Diverse Than the U.S.






### Portland MSA Tends To Have Higher Educational Attainment Than the U.S.




More Than One in Five Multnomah County Jobs is Held by Workers Aged 55 or Older

Portland Tri-County Population by Age, 2022






## Normally, workforce is supplemented by in-migration, but Oregon is currently seeing net out-migration

Number of households moving into the state minus the number moving out of the state



#### **Oregon Net Domestic Migration by Age**


Number of people moving into Oregon minus the number moving out of Oregon


### **Bad Housing Market for Buyers**




National Association of Realtors, Median Sales Price, Seasonally Adjusted and Inventory, 2012 - 2023



## Rent in the Portland MSA Has Declined Recently, But Has Increased Considerably Over the Past Several Years








# With Slow In-Migration and Birth Rate, Businesses Are Going To Have To Hire From The Existing Population Oregon's Labor Force Participation





# Utilities workers households in the Portland MSA, 2021




One in Four Portland MSA Utilities Jobs is Held by Workers Aged 55 or Older




### Clean Energy Grew 43% in Employment and 50% in Real Wages Over the Decade in Oregon





#### **Clean Energy Sector Tends To Offer Higher Wages**





Clean Energy Target Occupations Employment




