


Reasons Oregonians Ages 16+ are Not in Labor Force Annual Average, 1994-2023






UNEMPLOYMENT RATE SLIGHTLY ABOVE HISTORICALLY LOW LEVELS



COVID-19 Job Changes Compared to Great Recession Job Changes






JACKSON COUNTY FARING SLIGHTLY BETTER RECOVERING FROM THE PANDEMIC




Medford MSA job losses -0.9 compared to -1.4 for Grants Pass MSA 56 months after the beginning of the pandemic.




Josephine County Private education and health services









JOSEPHINE DATA SUPPRESSED, JACKSON ADDED 215 JOBS



JOSEPHINE HAD LOST JOBS BY YEARS END, JACKSON RECOVERED NOVEMBER 2023





Health care and social assistance represented 42% of all vacancies, with 25,400.

Note: The Oregon Job Vacancy Survey includes only private-sector businesses with two or more employees.

THE ROGUE VALLEY HAD ROUGHLY 5,200 JOB VACANCIES At any given time in 2023.

We surveyed 1,800 private employers with two or more employees.

If they were hiring, employers gave details about each vacancy, including:

- Job title
- Full- or part-time status
- Permanent or temporary status
- Starting wage or salary
- Educational and experience requirements

Businesses also identified if their vacancies were difficult to fill, and if so, they wrote in the primary reason they faced hiring challenges.

ACROSS OREGON, BUSINESSES REPORTED ROUGHLY 72,800 VACANCIES AT ANY GIVEN TIME IN 2023.

The number of Oregon job vacancies declined from 2022 to 2023, as the recovery from the 2020 pandemic recession slowed. Employers reported about six out of 10 openings were difficult to fill in 2023.

Characteristics Oregon employers are looking for didn't change much during the pandemic recession and recovery. A typical job vacancy tends to be for a full-time, permanent position. 39% require education beyond high school and 58% require previous experience.
